AUTHORITY LEVEL:

3. HEALTH & SAFETY OFFICER (H&S OFFICER)

An H&S Officer is a dedicated safety professional responsible for developing, implementing, and maintaining workplace safety programs. This role is typically more specialized and requires in-depth knowledge of occupational health and safety laws.

Key Responsibilities:

- Develop and enforce health and safety policies and procedures.
- Conduct risk assessments and implement hazard controls.
- Ensure compliance with occupational safety laws and regulations.
- Investigate workplace accidents and implement preventive measures.
- Provide training programs and awareness campaigns.
- Liaise with regulatory authorities during audits and inspections.



AUTHORITY LEVEL:

H&S Officers often have the highest authority in health and safety within a company, reporting directly to senior management or compliance bodies.

Larger organizations or high-risk industries (construction, manufacturing, healthcare, etc.) where a full-time safety professional is needed.
